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Lowland Leader Assessment Course Example Program

Summary:

This example program gives you an indication of what is involved on a 2-day Lowland Leader assessment course. Each course is individual & reactive to both participant & environmental factors. When you book a course you'll receive a program specific to the course you attend.

Note:

Candidates are reminded that before booking onto a Lowland Leader assessment course they must have attended a Lowland Leader training course (or have been granted exemption), must be familiar with the syllabus & must have logged a minimum of 20 walks in lowland terrain.

To be issued with a 'pass' you must also hold a valid relevant first aid certificate.

Day 1:

We'll usually meet around 9am for a quick coffee & introductions

- Assessment of:
- Route planning
- Navigation in a lowland environment
- Walking and route finding
- Hazard Identification
- Group management
- Personal equipment
- Group/leader equipment

- Feedback

Day 2:

We'll usually meet around 9am & have a recap and Q&A over coffee

- Assessment of:
- Background knowledge and understanding (access, conservation, weather interpretation)
- Responsibilities of a group leader
- Planning a quality lowland walk and identify the associated risks
- Navigation
- Walking and route finding
- Group management
- Hazard identification
- Accident/missing person procedures

We'll finish with:

- Feedback
- Next steps & pathways to further Mountain Training Qualifications

Outcomes:

Pass: Awarded when you demonstrate appropriate knowledge & application of the course syllabus combined with the necessary attributes of a Lowland Leader.

Defer: Awarded where you have generally performed well & shown the necessary experience & attributes but where complete proficiency has not been attained in some aspects or experience.

Fail: Awarded where performance has generally been weak or experience has not ben shown.

Next

Where performance merits a defer or fail you will receive a formal written report containing specific feedback.

Steps: In the case of a fail a complete assessment course will need to be undertaken. For a deferral only part of a course may be required & feedback will indicate this.
